## THE CHALLENGE

More than 22,000 people in Nepal are diagnosed with cancer every year, but only a fraction have access to the care they desperately need.

66.8% of these patients die, primarily due to the lack of accessible, life-saving cancer care.

This is not just Nepal's challenge. This is a global responsibility.

## THE SOLUTION

Binaytara is building a state-of-the-art, 200-bed hospital in Madhesh Province, equipped with cutting-edge medical technologies.

This facility will provide life-saving cancer care to a population of 25 million people in southern Nepal and the Indian state of Bihar, serving an estimated 20,000 patients annually.

## OUR IMPACT

Since 2018, Binaytara has been running a 25-bed cancer hospital in Madhesh Province in Southern Nepal, and served over 1,700 local patients with cancer care.

As the only cancer center in the region, we have developed strong partnerships with the local government and community.

## MEET AARAV

It began as a severe belly ache, like so many common diseases that children contract and overcome during their early years. Manjula's oldest child, Shivani, after being misdiagnosed by local doctors, was eventually diagnosed with late-stage Wilms' Tumor, a rare kidney cancer that mainly affects children. Despite their best efforts, Shivani passed away. Tragically, in a very rare case of Wilms tumor, Manjula's two younger children, her son Aarav and her daughter Shristi, soon started displaying similar symptoms to their older sister and were also diagnosed with the same cancer.

This time, Manjula was referred to Binaytara Cancer Center from the children's hospital in Kathmandu. Our local hospital team and our international tumor board reviewed the cases of Shristi and Aarav. We covered the cost of their treatment to ease the financial burden, provided chemotherapy rounds, and then recommended surgery for Shristi.

Tragically, even after rounds of chemotherapy, no surgeon could perform the needed surgery and Shristi passed away earlier this year. On the other hand, Aarav responded better to the chemotherapy and is doing better. This tragedy underlies the critical need for increased awareness about early cancer detection and better access to comprehensive cancer care.

A person's odds of beating cancer shouldn't depend on where they live or how much money they have. But the reality is that it does. Together, we can change that.
